## **Resolution Evening**



This year's resolution is titled 'Dental Health Matters'. To help with WI discussions we held a zoom session where we were joined by dentist Gill Gauntlett, who gave us much to think about. There have been several resolutions over the years about dental care including one in 1996 which highlighted the lack of NHS dentists and urged the government to ensure that NHS dental treatment was available to all – not that much different to the resolution being put forward this year, so why haven't things changed, and will this resolution make a difference?

The resolution is asking for a review of current contracts although changes have already been proposed and some have been introduced. New training places are to be made available and there are discussions about opening a dental school in Norwich. There are also talks about fast tracking overseas dental graduates which will improve the workforce. As for dental access, several measures have been proposed such as travelling dental clinics, incentives for dentists to do more NHS work and a requirement for graduates to stay in the NHS for a period of time after qualifying. In other words, much is already being done so is this resolution too late and where will the additional money needed for investment come from?

There is however a need for improved access to dental services. Covid affected dental care and practice costs have risen over the years. Dental need has increased due to poor diet, lack of oral hygiene and there is a demand for more cosmetic dentistry procedures. Dentists are self-employed so need to make their practices profitable which is why many are leaving the NHS to offer treatment under private contract. Current NHS contracts are unpopular and despite the changes, there is still a shortage of dentists.

Will this resolution make a difference? That is for your WI to decide but please make sure that you send your vote (and discretionary vote) to your delegate in time for the Annual Meeting in early June.

### **Clean Rivers Campaign Spring Update**

NFWI is asking local WIs to join with groups in their area campaigning for clean rivers to sound the alarm



about the ecological state of the UK's rivers,

Locally we have supported Cam Valley Forum in their bid to get bathing water designation for Sheeps

Green in Cambridge. In October 2023 Cam Valley Forum applied to Defra (Department for Environment Food and Rural Affairs) for Designated Bathing Water status for Sheep's Green, to help clean up the sewage pollution of the Cam. On 26 February 2024, they were pleased to hear that they have been shortlisted by Defra in the final statutory consultation for designation. We should be hearing in April 2024 (after this goes to press) whether they been successful.

Why bathing water designation?

Bathing Water Designation shines a light on the water quality at a specific site which puts polluters in the spotlight. Defra's rules restrict applications to a single short stretch that's already a popular swimming area,

with car park and toilets nearby. If the water is not fit for bathing it is not fit for wildlife! Designation imposes a legal obligation on the water company to clean up,



while also accessing the Environment Agency monitoring and Ofwat. It is expected the results will indicate the water quality will certainly be "poor.! The nearest water treatment works up river is under scrutiny, in this case the Haslingfield works; once the problems here have been addressed, the water quality in the Cam should improve - something for which we have all been campaigning.

Cam Valley reports: During 2023, the sewage works at Haslingfield was spilling sewage for 3000 hours, (34% of the year.) Cambridge Sewage Works, was discharging into the river where our boat race crews train, for 17% of the year.
