Raspberry and Amaretto Fool



Serves 4 Ingredients

- 200- 250g fresh or frozen raspberries
- 200g condensed milk
- 2 tbsp amaretto or similar liqueur
- 150ml natural yoghurt
- 300ml double cream, whipped
- 125g amaretti biscuits

Method

Whizz together the raspberries, liqueur, condensed milk and yoghurt until smooth.

Fold in the whipped cream.

Lightly crush all the biscuits, reserve four whole.
Get 4 glasses or large glass bowl.

Put a layer of biscuits, followed by a layer of raspberry mixture, repeating, finishing with a layer of raspberry mixture.

Care Network Coffee Morning

I must admit I hadn't really heard of Care Network, which was reason enough to attend the Coffee Morning at CFWI on 27 May to satisfy my curiosity. It was enlightening! Head of Service, Emma Flanz, gave a very informative presentation about the broad range of services this Charity provides throughout Cambridgeshire. She explained how Care Network was started by local vicar's wife Sheila Stephenson in 1970, after a stay in hospital made her realise the need for practical and emotional help in the home on discharge to prevent loss of independence. At this point some of our ladies explained, with obvious affection, that they knew Sheila and told us that she was now in her nineties and that, sadly, her vicar husband had very recently passed away. We learnt from Emma that Care Network uses staff and volunteers to provide essential, free, and personalised support services. Examples of these include food shopping, light housework and gardening, collecting prescriptions, a Check and Chat or Trusted Friend service, through which people returning from hospital can be supported in reconnecting with their community to avoid isolation and loneliness. In addition to their **Help At Home** service, Care Network coordinates a **Community Car Scheme** (to transport to shops, appointments or social events) and a one-to-one **Wellbeing** service to support individuals in boosting their mood and self-confidence in the community. Anyone, including individuals themselves, concerned families, hospital or community-based professionals and other organisations can make a referral for help.

Our members had lots of questions for Emma, in particular about the challenges faced in finding volunteers in all age groups. There was, however, unanimous agreement on the rewards gained by

volunteering which, interestingly, sit nicely with the **5 ways to Wellbeing** which Care Network aims to foster in their clients:

Connect: Build relationships with family, friends, colleagues, and neighbours.

Be Active: Engage in physical activities like walking, cycling, or any enjoyable exercise.

Take Notice: Be aware of your surroundings and appreciate the present moment.

Keep Learning: Try new things or develop new skills to stimulate your mind.

Give: Help others and contribute to your community

Take a look at their website care-network.org.uk and be inspired..... or talk to our very own Jane Stoner at CFWI who is also involved in this Charity.

CFWI hosted this Coffee Morning in extremely hot weather and everyone was very appreciative of their attention to *our* Wellbeing by providing a well ventilated room and plenty of water to drink in addition to tea and coffee accompanied by delicious home-made scones with jam and cream as well as chocolate brownies. What a treat!

EARLY BIRDS WI

On the 8th May, we were given a talk by Diane Manian, "My Lourdes Experience as a Nurse". We were given an insight on how she came to help assist and care for people with many disabilities to enable these people to visit Lourdes. The trip every year is accompanied by doctors and several medical professionals. Diane says she has witnessed several improvements and even cures after patients visits, which have been verified against the patient's medical records.

At our June meeting we were given a talk by Jane Bower, on her early years at Austin Hall, Headingley, Leeds. Jane is a retired Art teacher. Austin Hall is named after Alfred Austin, a Poet Laureate from 1896 until his death in 1913. By the time Jane lived in Austin Hall it had been divided into flats. Here she resided with her parents in one of the flats with her siblings, at a rent of £8:15 shillings. Jane spoke about the lovely gardens in which she had privileged to play. One of her many memories was a garden house with which she was fascinated, especially the glass-stained windows. With many changes in recent years, the garden house had fallen into disrepair. Jane's friend, who resides Up North still, had noticed this and was able to salvage the stained-glass windows, which are now shown in all their glory in Jane's shed here in Cambridge.

BALSHAM WI

For our May meeting Bob Ensich, came to talk to us about 'FutureIN' and 'It Takes a City' initiatives. When Bob retired from a long career in the construction industry, he joined the board of TrAC, an organisation that employs apprentices directly and places them with companies primarily in the construction industry.

He then went on to form FutureIN, a partnership with Cambridge property developer Howard Group, which provides training opportunities specifically for vulnerable and disadvantaged young people locally. Bob did not stop there, and he now also works with It Takes a City, a charity working to end homelessness in the city.

It was a very insightful talk about the important work and the difference that these organisations are making locally.

Our June meeting saw us taking a historical walk around some of Balsham's best-known points of interest, under the guide of Balsham WI member and local history expert Jan Ellam. Firstly, we visited the Prince Memorial on The Green and Jan told us about the well that once was here. We also heard about the slab of granite stone that displays the "best kept village" plaque, and the village sign – the earlier version of which was presented to the village by the WI.

On to The Old Butcher's, which is now a popular coffee shop, and then to The Old School House on Church Lane. This was the village school from the 1860s until 1971 when the present Meadow School was built. Then it was back to the Pavilion for refreshments and WI business. Our thanks to Jan for such an enjoyable evening.

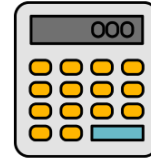
