Resolutions over the Years

As you vote for the resolution that you would like to go forward to the Annual meeting, we thought it would be good to look at resolutions in more detail. WI resolution campaigns are member led and are about changing things for the better and tackling issues that really matter to people. Over the past 100 years, members have campaigned to empower and support women within society by exerting their individual and collective influence bringing a series of controversial issues into the public domain and often resulting in changes in legislation and government policy.

Over the next few months, we will be looking at some of the resolutions over the years and what better place to start but with the very first one.

Passed in 1918 at the NFWI's second Annual Meeting the very first WI resolution was all about housing. The resolution called for a 'sufficient supply of convenient and sanitary houses, being of vital importance to women in the country' and urged local authorities to take advantage of the government scheme for state-aided housing. This would have been a very bold resolution in the early 1900's especially coming from a voluntary group of non-political women! It's also very relevant today!






